1890—23.7 percent of reservation land within one mile of a river. 1915----10.5 percent of reservation land within one mile of a river.



Resource Endowments reduced Growth

•Reservations with greater endowments in 1915 had higher incomes in 1915.

 However, reservations with greater endowments had slower growth between 1915 and 1999.

Allotment Raised Costs of Doing Business



Land transferred from Indian *jurisdiction,* fractionation, and dead capital.
