Two Stories...

International Sustainable Mineral Development Law

- Johannesburg PI: "mining, minerals and metals" are "important to the economic and social development of many countries" and "minerals are essential for modern living"
- P2 (sovereignty over natural resources, do no harm)
- P11 (environmental laws?)

Global Environmental Justice and Mining-Affected Communities

- JPI: satisfying consumption patterns of the "north" or sustainable livelihoods of the "south"?
- Indigenous Rights;
 Environmental Rights
- Resistance: "environmental human rights defenders"

Two Responses...

States

- Good governance: capacity/will
- Participation of stakeholders
 - local and indigenous communities, and women, to play an active role ...
- Mining Policy Framework

Extractive companies

- Business responsibilities for human rights
 - Indigenous and environmental rightsholders?

Indigenous Rights

- UN Declaration on Rights of Indigenous Peoples
 - (Canadian law: s.35 constitutional protections?)
- James Anaya, Special Rapporteur, HRC (2013)
 - Free prior and informed consent (FPIC)
 - Substantive rights? Property, culture, religion including sacred places, health, clean and healthy environment, priorities in development as part of self-determination...
 - Consultation and consent, prior impact assessment, mitigation, benefit-sharing
 - Independent responsibility of extractive companies
 - Indigenous companies?

Environmental Rights

- John Knox, Independent Expert on Human Rights and the Environment (2014 Mapping)
 - Procedural environmental rights:
 - Access to information (assess impacts, make public)
 - Public participation in decision-making (expression, association, life, liberty, security...)
 - [environmental human rights defenders]
 - Access to justice
 - Substantive environmental rights:
 - Legal framework (constitutional rights?)
 - Water, health, healthy environment
 - State obligations to regulate private actors

Business and Human Rights

- 2011 United Nations Guiding Principles for Business and Human Rights: *polycentric governance*
 - State duty to protect (IHRL)
 - Business responsibility to respect (society?)
 - All rights: Indigenous Rights; Environmental Rights?
 - All businesses
 - Policy, HR due diligence, remedy
 - Access to Remedy
 - Judicial and Non-Judicial (NJGMs)
 - State-based and Non-state-based including company level

OECD MNE Guidelines

- General Policies
 - Sustainable development; respect IHRL
 - Meaningfully engage relevant stakeholders including local communities
- Environment Chapter
 - Management systems, etc
 - Information, consultation (qualified) (assessment)
 - (*No reference to remedy*)
- Human Rights Chapter:
 - mirrors UNGPs
- (No) reference to indigenous peoples; Adhering states?
