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Dr. Gusmano's research interests include politics of health care reform, comparative health systems, deliberative democracy, and normative theories of policy analysis. In addition to his position at the Hastings Center, Dr. Gusmano holds adjunct appointments at Columbia University and Yale University. His most recent book. Health Care in World Cities (Johns Hopkins University Press, 2010), documents the implications of national and local health care policies for access to care in New York, London and Paris. His previous book (with Colleen Grogan), Healthy Voices/Unhealthy Silence: Advocating for Poor People's Health (Georgetown University Press, 2007), examines how representatives for the poor participate in an advisory board process by tying together existing studies; extensive interviews with key players; and an in-depth, firsthand look at the Connecticut Medicaid advisory board's deliberations during the managed care debate. He holds a Ph.D. in political science from the University of Maryland at College Park and a Masters in public policy from the State University of New York at Albany. He was also postdoctoral fellow in the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Scholars in Health Policy program at Yale University (1995-1997). Dr. Gusmano is the president of the American Political Science Association's Organized Section on Health Politics and Policy. He serves on the editorial boards for the Journal of Health Politics, Policy and Law, Health Economics Policy and Law, and The Hastings Center Report.
