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Yaniv Heled researches and writes on legal and ethical aspects of biomedical technologies, such as biologics and biosimilars, stem cells, cloning and DNA sequencing and testing. His research has focused on the regulation of biosimilars and on regulatory competitive shelters (a.k.a. regulatory exclusivities) — an increasingly important type of government benefits afforded to developers of technology. Prior to Georgia State Law, Heled practiced intellectual property law with Goodwin Procter LLP in New York. Heled earned a J.S.D. from Columbia University School of Law. His doctoral dissertation focused on the regulation of novel biomedical technologies. In addition, Heled holds an LL.M. from Columbia, where he was a Harlan Fiske Stone Scholar, and an LL.B. and undergraduate Diploma in Biology, *magna cum laude*, from Tel Aviv University.
